On the evening of June 26th we will gather in Cincinnati Ohio and have a short orientation followed by a showing of Incident at Oglala the Leonard Peltier Story. Check the web site for more details

The run will start on the morning of June 27th at Chief Little Turtle Statue Located on River Side Drive in Covington KY at 9:00 am. From there we will travel through Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland and DC.

On July 3rd we will arrive in Lewisburg PA where Leonard Peltier is being held and on July 4th we will hold a non-violent vigil in front of the prison for Leonard Peltier's Independence day.

> Then we will continue on to Washington DC arriving on July 7th then on the morning of July 8th we will meet with The Longest Walk Three ~ Reversing Diabetes and finish these two events together.

Leonard Peltier a citizen of the Anishinabe and Lakota Nations, is a father, a grandfather, an artist, a writer, and an Indigenous rights activist. He has spent more than thirty five years in prison for a crime he did not commit. Amnesty International considers him a "political prisoner" who should be "immediately and unconditionally released."

To the international community, the case of Leonard Peltier is a stain on America's Human Rights record. Nelson Mandela, Rigoberta Menchu, the U.N. High Commissioner on Human Rights, the Dalai Lama, the European Parliament, the Kennedy Memorial Center for Human Rights, and Rev. Jesse Jackson are only a few who have called for his freedom. To many Indigenous Peoples, Leonard Peltier is a symbol of the long history of abuse and repression they have endured. The National Congress of American Indians and the Assembly of First Nations, representing the majority of First Nations in the U.S. and Canada, have repeatedly called for Leonard Peltier's freedom.
